Others who won ribbons in the 4-H Club division were Steve Ham, first place, class B; Mike Jordan, sixth place, class B; Steve Taylor, second place, and Angela Garrett, seventh place, class C.

The classes were determined by the weight of the animals, according to Earl Collins, assistant county agent.

In the FFA Division, a steer belonging to John Garrett of Malone won fifth place in class C.

A Jackson County 4-H judging team composed of Steve Ham of Greenwood, Mike Jordan of Malone, and Ted and Steve Taylor of Graceville placed sixth in the 4-H judging competition.

The grand champion of the show belonged to Steve Taylor of the Graceville 4-H Club.

Her father, Benjamin Cliff, is retired from the U. S. Air Force after 32 years. Her mother is the former Doris Herring of Malone.

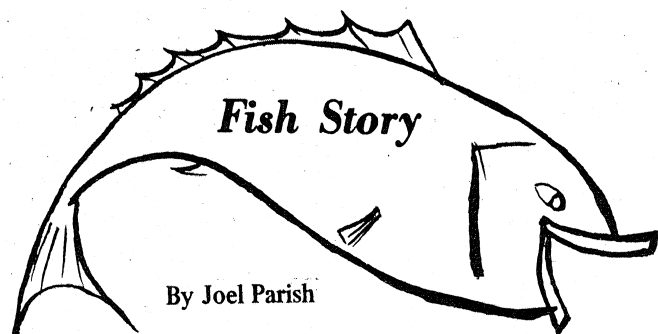
Miss Cliff left Malone on Tuesday to return to college. She has spent a six-weeks break between semesters with her grandmother and other relatives.

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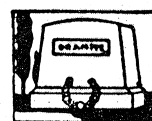
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Cherokee Tournament Will Be Played In Malone Gym

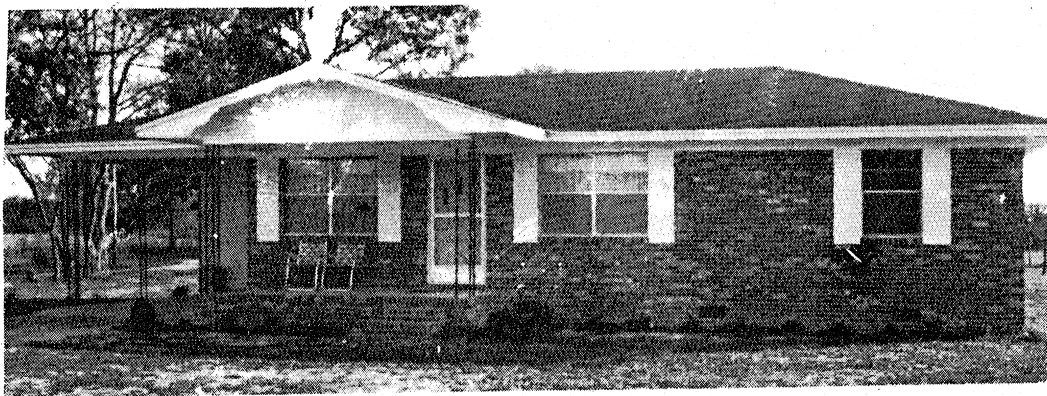

Organized Jan. 28, 1912 First Baptist Church Celebrates Homecoming

The First Baptist Church of Malone celebrated its 60th anniversary with a homecoming service and dinner on Sunday, Jan. 30.

The Rev. Roscoe Hall, a former pastor, delivered the morning sermon.

Highlights of the service included a reading of the church history by Dalton Hagler and the presentation of plaques to L. L. Dekle and J. C. Langston for 50 years service as deacons of the church.

Corsages were presented to Miss Yulee Ford of Malone, the longest continuous member of the church; to Mrs. Ruby Hatton Oswald of Marianna who was a charter member of the church; and to Mrs. Fannie Herring who at 86 is the oldest active member of the congregation.

Among the crowd of approximately 200 in attendance were dozens of former members.

The Church was organized on Jan. 28, 1912, at a meeting in a Malone school building.

History

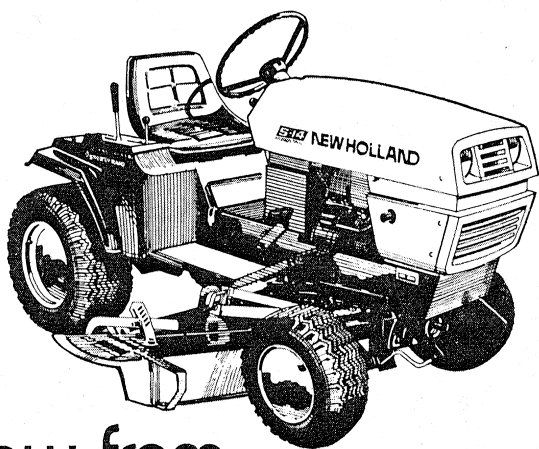
The charter members were Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Fussell, Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Flowers, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Cook, E. L. Marbury, Miss Byrd Williams, Stephen Anderson, A. R. Anderson, Miss Ruby Hatton, Mrs. Arch Mathews, Dr. J. C. Patterson and Mrs. Katie Tally.

Six lots--where the present church is located--were acquired in 1915. Although minutes of the church from 1915 to 1921 are missing, it is believed that the first church building, a wooden structure, was begun in 1915 and completed early in 1916.

A pastorium was added in 1927.

The first service in the present brick church was held on Dec. 4, 1955. The committee that presided over its construction was composed of Harvey Paulk, H. D. Hagler, R. E. Brunson, G. M. Ford and L. L. Dekle.

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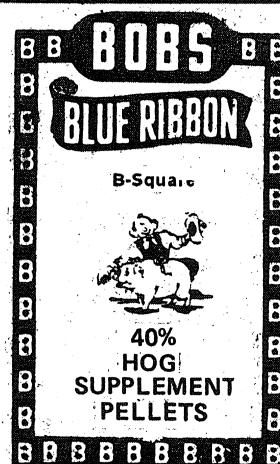

The committee in charge of raising the \$37,000 for the new building was composed of Tom Snipes, Mrs. Meda Williams, Bill Ford, Mrs. R. E. Brunson and Johnny Williams.

The church had only one preaching service a month from 1912 until 1921 when it began twice-a-month services. Services began full-time in 1937.

Beginning with 14 charter members in 1912, the church had grown to 192 in 1955. In 1972, the church has 225 members.

In 1912, the pastor was paid \$166 per year in money plus "certain provisions." In 1928,

the pastor was paid \$720, and in 1955, \$1,800. Today, the church pays its pastor \$7,240 per year.

Jackson Speaks At Chamber Meet

The announcement of a new plant to be located in Sneads preceded an address by presidential hopeful Sen. Henry Jackson at the annual meeting of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce on Thursday night, Jan. 28, in the Marianna High School cafeteria.

Chamber President John Manor said that the new plant, which will be incorporated under the name, Big Bend Industries, Inc., will initially employ 80 persons and will be located in the old Liddorf Company building in Sneads.

The plant will make men's double-knit slacks. Production is scheduled to begin by March 30.

When fully operative, Manor said, the plant will employ 200 and will bring a payroll of one-half million "sorely needed dollars" to the area.

Manor also announced that two goals of the Chamber during 1972 will be 1,000 additional jobs in the county and the promotion of Marianna as a retail shopping center for the area.

In introducing Sen. Jackson to the audience, Congressman Bob Sikes said the candidate is "the most important Jackson to come our way since Andrew Jackson 150 years ago."

As president, Jackson said that he would do whatever is possible to develop rural America and to preserve the family farm. Industries would be offered tax incentives to locate in areas like Jackson County where jobs are needed.

However, his number one priority as president, Jackson said, would be to "get this

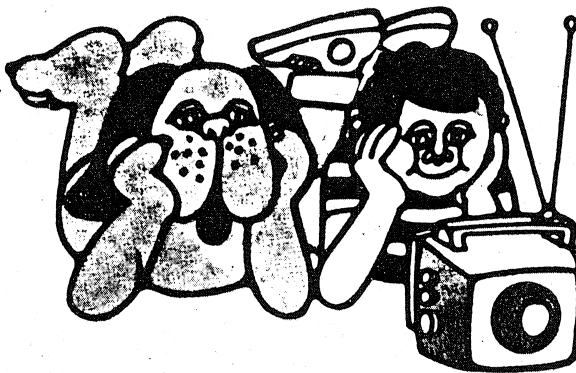
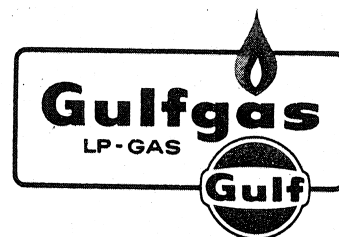
country moving again economically."

In order to restore safety to America's streets, Jackson said that he would sponsor penal reform and the speedy administration of criminal justice so that persons accused of crimes of violence would be brought to trial within 60 days, rather than being released on bail.

Jackson said that he does not favor amnesty for American armed forces deserters because "I don't see how you can explain that to the next of kin of a man who made the supreme sacrifice."

The senator also spoke in favor of quality education for every child. "I want to see every poor child, white or black, get an education equal to the best," he said.

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
