Processing For Stamp Recipients Begins March 1

Beginning Wednesday, March 1, needy persons in Jackson County may apply for food stamps in Marianna at 516 E. Lafayette St. (the old Cowart Motors Company building).

Commodities will be distributed in Malone on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Feb. 21-23, for the last time before the county switches to the food stamp program.

Apply In Person

Officials emphasize that the stamp program is an entirely new program and anyone who wishes to receive stamps must visit the new office in Marianna and fill out an application.

Even people who are now receiving commodities must visit the stamp office and file an application. Although stamp applications have been distributed to some people this month as they received their commodities, the applications must be taken to the stamp office in person.

However, after a person has visited the office and been approved to receive food stamps, he need not return to the office again. He can mail in his stamp payment each month and his food stamps will be sent to him by mail.

The stamps can be traded in any grocery store that has been approved to receive them by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Edible Goods Only

The stamps can be used only for edible goods. They cannot be traded for alcoholic beverages, tobacco or paper products, animal foods or imported foods.

While 4,367 needy people in Jackson County have received commodities under the county commodity foods distribution program, it is expected that more than 9,000 will be eligible for food stamps.

More May Qualify

Many people who could not qualify for commodities can qualify for the stamps. In addition to welfare recipients, also eligible for food stamps are people receiving small payments from social security, retirement pensions and veterans benefits.

Although commodities were free, a fee is charged the recipients of stamps. The fee is based upon ability to pay.

Payment for Stamps

The State Division of Family Services, which administers the stamp program, estimates that the average family receiving the stamps is composed of 3.6 persons who pay \$24.47 of their own money each month in exchange for \$88 worth of food stamps.

Grocery stores in the county are expected to receive approximately \$232,840 monthly in business from the food stamps, according to estimates made by the State Division of Family Services.





An historical marker for Great Oaks, ante-bellum home in Greenwood, was unveiled by the Jackson County Historical Commission at a ceremony on Saturday afternoon, Feb. 12.

The marker was unveiled by Lawrence Pender, III, great-great-great grandson of Hamilton Bryan who had the house built in 1860 for his mother and eight sisters.

Descendants of the Bryan family owned the house until 1961 when it was purchased by Claude Reese, chairman of the Jackson County Historical Commission.

Between 1961 and 1965, Mr. and Mrs. Reese had the house restored to its original grandeur, both outside and in. Its interior is furnished in antiques, many of European origin.

At the ceremony Reese displayed the receipt of payment for \$5,500 given to Hamilton Bryan by the contractor, Isaac

The site of the house, at the south city limits of Greenwood, was originally part of a 5,200 acre plantation established by Hamilton Bryan's father, Elijah Bryan, a pioneer settler in the area.

Also on display Saturday afternoon was a photograph album on the restoration of Great Oaks that has been kept by the Reese family. The photographs show the mansion interior and exterior during the various stages of its transformation from a ruin to a proud monument.

Mrs. Frank Harris presided over the ceremony on Saturday afternoon. The Rev. Jimmy Miller delivered an invocation and Billy Grant gave a brief talk on the history of the house.

The Great Oaks marker is the first of several that the historical commission plans to erect this year in commemoration of the county's 150th birthday.



Tied 20-20 at the end of four quarters of play, the Lakers outscored the Hawks by one point in an overtime to take the game, 23-22.


Randy Jordan led the Lakers
