

## County Employees Will Receive Frozen Raises

Those county employees whose salary increases came due during the wage-price freeze will receive their raises next month, Jackson County Commissioners decided at their regular meeting Tuesday morning, Nov. 23.

None of the salary increases exceeds the 5.5 per cent limit which has been recommended by the national wage-price control council.

The commissioners accepted a bid of \$24,065 for a road grader from Burford Equipment Company of Montgomery, Ala.

A lower bid of \$21,746 from Ray Brooks Machinery Company of Montgomery was rejected.

## Hospital Board Granted Two New Appointees

Robert Pender, mayor of Greenwood, and E. Fred Gilbert, Jr., mayor of Cottondale, have been appointed to four-year terms on the Jackson Hospital Board of Trustees by Gov. Reuben Askew.

The two vacancies on the board were caused by the retirements of W. L. Johnson of Malone and Raymond Cartledge of Cottondale.

## Commissioners Explain Difference Between District And Working Area

Marianna will not receive twenty per cent of Jackson County's secondary road funds even though it has been consolidated into a single district, the Jackson County Board of Commissioners explained at a special meeting Thursday morning, Nov. 18.

The meeting was called to answer questions and clear up misunderstandings about the new districts which were set at the commission's meeting on Tuesday, Nov. 9.

About two dozen spectators, including representatives of the Marianna city government, the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce and Jackson Hospital, attended the meeting.

Commission Chairman C. B. Sapp, Jr., said he was sorry that some people misunderstood the board's action. The fact that the city of Marianna is now a single

district, rather than being distributed among three districts, merely gives the city a single representative on the board.

However, the expenditure of county road and bridge funds will continue to be assigned by the whole board of five commissioners.

#### **Working Areas**

Sapp also explained that the commissioner from Marianna, although he represents the city area, will continue to be responsible for the roads in his "working area."

Regardless of the district that he represents, Sapp said, each of the five commissioners has a working area where he is responsible for one-fifth of the county's unpaved roads. Each

commissioner has two road machines at his disposal to maintain approximately 250 miles of roads.

The working areas will not change even though the county has been redistricted, because the working areas are decided on the basis of the miles of roads to be maintained, rather than on the basis of population.

"We are not going to move secondary road money out of the rural area and into the city,'

"The municipalities have a stake in the rural roads," Sapp said. "The people can't get to town to shop if the rural roads are not maintained."

#### New Funds

The county has shared some of its secondary road funds with the county'municipalities in the past, Sapp explained, but this will be unnecessary in the

The last session of the state legislature voted a new gas tax which is earmarked for road maintenance in municipalities. When this new tax money begins to come in, Marianna should receive about \$60,000 per year Sapp estimated. The county's

other municipalities will also receive funds from the new tax.

#### **Hospital Districts**


District Five Commissioner M. A. Schack, who drew up the new districts for the board, said it is unimportant that the new districts do not conform to the tax districts for Jackson Hospital and Campbellton-Graceville Hospital. The hospital tax districts were created by the legislature and the county tax collector will continue to collect the hospital tax depending upon which hospital district residents live in.

Marianna Mayor Fred Harris and Councilman Bob Pforte indicated their approval of the new districting. "I'm glad the board finally got around to doing what was right," Mayor Harris said. "The City never had a real representative on this board."

#### **Toll-Free Telephones**

In other business, the commissioners voted to petition the Florida Public Utilities Commission to approve toll-free telephone service throughout Jackson County.

Chairman Sapp said that after the utilities commission is petitioned, it will probably arrange to hold public meetings in the county to hear arguments for and against toll-free service.





He was born in Houston County, Ala., but had lived most of his 84 years at Dudley. He was a retired farmer and a member of the Friendship Methodist Church of Gordon.


The survivors include two sons, James A. Conrad of Ft. Myers and William B. Conrad of Bascom; seven grandchildren and one great grandson.

## Bevis Clan Erects New Monument For Founders

A new monument was erected on Monday, Nov. 22, over the graves of William Langley Bevis and his wife, Jennie Palmer Bevis, of Two Egg, the ancestors of all the Bevises in Florida.

The granite monument was erected over the graves in the Greenwood Baptist Cemetery by the Bevis Clan of Florida to replace the original limestone monument.

The Bevis coat of arms is engraved in the center of the new stone.

William Langley Bevis was born in Lincolnshire, England, on Jan. 3, 1791. He and his wife settled in Two Egg in 1855. He died in October of 1870 and she died in November of 1882. The couple had 12 children, nine sons and three daughters. Their descendants now number several hundreds who belong to the Bevis Clan of Florida. The clan meets one Sunday each June at Three Rivers State Park.

The family has maintained a complete and detailed history of its descendants since its founders came to America.

### Interest Rate Reduced For Farmer Loans

A reduction of one-fourth of one per cent in the variable interest rate on long-term farm loans has been announced by Neil P. Johnson, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Marianna.

The latest reduction, which is the fourth this year, was made possible by improved conditions in the wholesale money market and the continuing increase in

loan volume at the variable interest rate, Johnson said.

The Marianna Association is one of 46 Land Bank Associations in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina which makes long-term farm loans that can be repaid on a variable schedule without pre-payment penalties.






